Tenebrae—Good Friday Service of Light and Darkness

Tenebrae (Latin for "darkness") was the name given to the medieval predawn morning prayer celebrated by monks during the last three days in Holy Week. In recent centuries, this monastic liturgy—despite its early morning light imagery—was transferred to Wednesday evening in Holy Week. In monastic practice, it was a service of prayers and readings from scripture. As the light began to dawn, the candles used for reading were gradually extinguished, so that at the end of the service, the rising sun provided the necessary light for reading and singing.

In the service here, the extinguishing of candles has been placed within the reading of the Passion according to John, the ancient gospel narrative for the day. With this form, seven candles will be used. Following each section, a candle is extinguished.

The Johannine passion account is appointed for Good Friday because the synoptic passion accounts are read in successive years of the Sunday of the Passion. John's passion account sees Jesus' death as his glorification. Rather than "mourning" the dying or dead Jesus on Good Friday, the cross is acclaimed as the sign of the world's redemption. The procession of the cross and adoration of the crucified Christ become the primary symbolic action of this day. We offer honor and reverence to the one who, lifted up from earth, draws all people to himself. This service does not end in darkness and sadness, as if the assembly were reenacting the death of Christ. Rather, the liturgy end with Christ exalted on the cross, an image from John's gospel

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

Construction Update 2-12-24

The GOOD, the BAD, and the UGLY!

The good news is our lift has arrived in Billings ahead of schedule. G&J Enterprises has been notified to include our project on their schedule for installation. The library has been temporarily relocated to the northwest corner of the dining room. Ostlund Fire Protection has removed piping that conflicted with the lift. Near the end of phase one, the new sprinkler heads will be installed prior to the ceiling tile. The electrical work in library and dining room areas has been completed to accommodate the new lift.

The bad news is Corland's construction schedule has slipped a couple of weeks. The steel shipment has yet to be confirmed. The later start date is not a bad thing, as we need time to address the ugly.

The ugly; as a requirement of the state, all construction projects require an environmental review for hazardous materials. A survey has been completed by Ingraham Environmental. A preliminary verbal report indicates the 12x12 floor tile and mastic (glue) have asbestos. This means the tile directly under lift and stairway area will need to be removed by a licensed company. We are working on a cost and schedule to remove tile.

While a bit concerning, these delays are a normal part of construction projects. We may have been overly optimistic on the start date. The environmental surveys may seem over the top; however, they protect staff, workers, and most importantly, the children from exposure.

It can take place any day between March 20 and April 23.



Commercials are banned in New Zealand.

According to the Broadcasting Act, TV and radio ads are prohibited between 6 a.m. and noon on Good Friday in New Zealand, out of respect for the religious day of observance. The same law holds true on Christmas, Easter Sunday and Anzac Day so as not to disrupt celebrations. The origin of the name "Good Friday" is unknown.

There are numerous theories behind the name Good Friday, but none are backed by solid evidence. Many believe that the "Good" means "Holy," while others are convinced that "Good" is a gradual change from "God." Each country and language has their own unique interpretation and translation.

Dancing is outlawed in Germany.

Dancing is prohibited on this sacred holiday, forcing nightclubs to close or risk being fined £1,000 (or \$1,300). In German, the name for the holiday translates as Sorrowful Friday.

You can watch a play for free in London.
